Trudie Gorman



Trudie is a working-class writer whose work explores the personal and political interplay between class, gender, and the body. Trudie has performed her poetry across Ireland and the UK and has published pieces in *Poetry Ireland, Poetry NI, Two Metre Review* and *The 32: An Anthology of Irish Working-Class Voices*. Her work has been broadcast on BBC Radio London. Trudie was selected for Poetry Ireland Versify Series 2019 and was also shortlisted for the Creative Future Writer's Award 2019. Trudie showcased her work To Love this Body at Poetry Ireland in March 2022. Trudie was awarded a residency at the Centre Cultural Irlandais in Paris in December 2022. The writing of her first collection of poetry is supported by the Arts Council of Ireland through Arts and Disability Ireland and Poetry Ireland.

Sam Killian



Sam is a writer, composer, and performer from Dublin. His primary focus is on building ambitious queer musical works for stage and screen, with a focus on empathy, absurd humour, and warmth. His work engages with deep ecology, and the abstraction of human emotions in the digital age. He is a founding member of *bluehouse theatre*. Recent work as a writer includes *Pig Brain*, a dark one-woman comedy about conspiracy theories, animal rights, and Elon Musk, at Dublin Fringe Festival and *Infinite Teleskop Loop*, a series of stories about magpies, aquarium owners and bars on the moon, at the Kevin Kavanagh Gallery and Dunamaise Arts Centre. As a composer, work includes *Spaces & Waves* at the Kevin Kavanagh Gallery: developed with Corcadorca Theatre Company, this is a presentation of a long-term musical about climate change, capitalism and whales. As well as *24/7 Bliss* with bluehouse theatre at Dublin Fringe Festival 2022, which Sam also performed in.



Nick Nikolaou



Nick is an Irish-based contemporary dance and queer artist. They graduated with First Class Honours from the MA in Contemporary Dance Performance from the University of Limerick. Before their post-graduate studies, Nick danced with the Dublin Youth Dance Company and other companies in Ireland and Greece, and has performed in many countries around Europe. Nick's current interests stem from past experiences and personal memories of movement from specific spaces. Their research of the past 2 years is around club and queer spaces and their importance on a person's existence and comfort. Nick has shared their research with other dancers and mentors such as Liz Roche, Philip Connaughton, Emma Martin and Tonie Walsh and has arrived at a fully rounded place in their personal work. Their last creation was a solo show that premiered at Dublin Fringe Festival in September 2022 called *Anatomy of a Night*. Nick's next step is to remove themself from just the personal perspective of the work and create a universal work with others.

Ciara Ní É



Spoken-word poet Ciara Ní É is Irish Writers Centre

ambassador and was DCU's Writer in Residence 2020. In 2019 she was announced as an Irish Writers Centre ambassador. Ciara is the founder of REIC, a monthly multilingual spoken word and open mic night that features poetry, music, storytelling and rap. She has performed internationally in New York, London, Brussels, Sweden, and across Ireland. She was chosen for Poetry Ireland's Introductions series in 2017. Her work has been published in journals Icarus, Aneas, and Comhar, and the anthology Queering the Green. She is a cofounder of queer arts collective AerachAiteachGaelach, set up with long-time collaborator Eoin Mc Evoy. Their first project with the group was chosen for the Abbey Theatre's 5x5 in 2020, and they premiered an immersive theatre piece at the Dublin Fringe Festival in 2021. At the moment she is cowriting a TV series for Tua Films. Ciara's other commissions include RTÉ TV, BBC Radio, TG4, and The Irish Writers Centre. Her first poetry collection is forthcoming. Ciara's work can be widely found online.

Tolü Makay



After unveiling her much anticipated debut EP 'Being' in October 2020, singer-songwriter Tolü Makay has continued to blossom since emerging with her 2018 single "Goodbye" – now with over 1 million streams. A seasoned vocalist with influences that span the likes of Erykah Badu and Nina Simone to Amy Winehouse and Asa, Tolü's trajectory into music seemed already predestined.

Her cover version of The Saw Doctors 30-year-old classic "N17" along with The RTÉ Concert Orchestra, performed on national TV at RTÉ's NYE show last year, charted No. 1 on Irish Airplay and iTunes charts in its first week of release. Tolü Makay showed no signs of slowing down and kept releasing singles such as 'Used To Be' and her most recent collaboration 'The Light' with Irish rapper Malaki.

Tolü Makay has become one of Ireland's most up-and-coming performing artists, this year having played at RTÉ's 'The Heart of Saturday Night' and Other Voices, Galway International Arts Festival. For her first Irish tour, Makay has sold out shows in Dublin, Cork and Galway and was awarded 'Woman of the Year' by Irish Tatler magazine. She performed at the 20-year anniversary of Other Voices in Kerry and Expo in Dubai alongside the Irish National Concert Hall Ensemble, led by conductor David Brophy.

Hot Deskers Dagogo Hart



Dagogo is a Dublin based poet, writer, and spoken word artist

whose words have wowed audiences from bar basements to Electric Picnic stages. He started performing in Dublin in 2016 in open mics and poetry slams, which saw him win the Slam Sunday grand slam in 2017 and become an All-Ireland Poetry Slam finalist in the same year. Since then he has performed for festivals like Electric Picnic, St. Patricks Festival, Dublin Fringe Festival, Drogheda Literary Festival, Cúirt International Poetry Festival, and First Fortnight. He is one-third of the collective WeAreGriot; a poetry collective that curates art events around poetry. His personal works include; poetry short film RedBeard Paddy, spoken word variety show, See True and spoken word



play, Boy Child (the previous two co-written with FeliSpeaks), Talkatives; a hip-hop and poetry slam produced by of WeAreGriot. His poetry is inspired by his hometown in Lagos, Nigeria, and his experiences since moving to Ireland.

Dara is a Dublin-based lighting designer and

theatre maker. Dara is a graduate of Rough Magic Theatre Company's SEEDS programme and of Trinity College Dublin, with a degree in Drama and Film Studies. As a designer and theatre maker Dara likes to work holistically, collaborating with other artists throughout the process to help shape the design narrative and visual language of a production.

Shanna May Breen & Luke Casserly

Shanna is an Offaly-born Dublin-based theatre-maker who is invested in devising theatre with groups of exciting people in interesting places. Previous works have seen her track Ireland's obsession with alcohol while drinking a bottle of Jameson live on stage at Battersea Arts Centre, walking from South to North Iceland to develop a show about 'journey' for Sprint Festival. Shanna was awarded the Next Stage Wild Card Award in 2018 by Dublin Fringe



Festival for *The Sound of Phoenix*, a travelling soundscape of the Phoenix Park on board a 1950's bus. Shanna recently performed and devised *Superstructure*, a show about the future of our cities for The Abbey Theatre, Dublin. Shanna completed her MA in ATP Scenography at The Royal Central School of Speech & Drama (London) and her BA in Devised Theatre at Dartington College of Art (Devon).





Luke is a theatre artist and director originally from Longford. His work to date has brought audiences on a suburban train to explore our national relationship with the material of plastic through sound (Mould Into Shape, 2019); sparked a national conversation around Ireland's biodiversity decline through planting a network of wildflower meadows across Ireland (1000 Miniature Meadows, 2020); and documented the

passing of time on a Midlands bog for an online audience over 6 days (Live Bog Project, 2020). He recently collaborated with Shanna May Breen to create *Root* for Dublin Theatre Festival 2021, a performative inquiry which looked at the importance of trees in our ecosystem - from the point of view of a tree. Previous directing credits also include *Viva Voce* by Lauren Shannon Jones (2018) and *efficacy 84* (2017). Luke holds a BA in Drama and Theatre Studies from Trinity College, Dublin and is Associate Director of PAN PAN Theatre Company.



<u>John King</u>

John is a theatre-maker from Dublin. He is director of Murmuration, a collective of theatre artists making narrative headphone shows in spaces around the city, whose work to date includes *Summertime* (Dublin Fringe, 2018; Drogheda Arts Festival, Abbey Young Curators' Festival, 2019), *Will I See You There* (Dublin Fringe, 2020) and *You're Still Here* (a Dublin Fringe commission, co-presented by the Abbey Theatre, 2021). Other directing credits include *The Cyclone Kid* (Bewleys, 2021), *The Overcoat* (Omnibus Theatre and OSO Barnes, 2018), and a series of works with performance artist Joseph Morgan Schofield (various UK venues, 2020).

He is an Associate Artist of Solas Nua in Washington D.C., where his work includes *side-walks* (co-written with Jeremy K Hunter, 2021), *Somewhere in the Future Dark* (2019), and the participatory zoom story-telling event *what's on ur walls* (2020). He was a participant on the Donmar Warehouse's Future Forms initiative (2021), a Resident Assistant Director at Studio Theatre, Washington, D.C., on their 2018-19 season, an alumnus of the Royal Court's Introductory Writers Group (2018), and a former Research Intern at Shakespeare's Globe (2017). His work has been published by Methuen Drama.

Hannah is a writer, actress and comedian based in Dublin. Her first one-woman show *The Egg is a Lonely Hunter*, which premiered at the Dublin Fringe Festival 2017, was subsequently nominated for three awards and asked to return for the First Fortnight Festival. After which it completed a successful five star run at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival 2018. Her most recent show *Symphony of Worms* supported by the Pan Pan Platform, premiered at the Dublin Fringe Festival 2019 where it was nominated for three awards, and won the *Spirit of Wit* Award. In 2020 she was awarded the Dream on Bursary and in 2021 she was commissioned by Dublin Fringe and The Abbey to produce a 15 minute audio piece for that year's festival.

Her most recent screen writing credits includes work for Element Pictures, Green Pavillion and the development of her own TV series with Calico Pictures. She regularly writes and performs her own stand up and collaborates with comedy group Dreamgun. She has performed at Body and Soul, the Vodafone Comedy Festival, and the Cat Laughs Comedy Festival.

Fionn is an award-winning actor, writer and composer based in Dublin, Ireland. Recent writing and composition credits include *Tonic*, which was produced by multi-award winning Rough Magic Theatre Company for Dublin Fringe Festival and Kilkenny Arts Festival.

His solo performance *Brendan Galileo for Europe* toured Ireland & the UK and won the awards for 'Best Performer' and 'Bewley's Little Gem' at Dublin Fringe 2018. His acclaimed new musical *Fierce Notions* won the 'Judge's Choice Award' at Dublin Fringe Festival in 2017. Other writing and composing credits include *Eamonn (from Menswear)* and the songs for the award-winning *Half Light*, which toured nationally. BITTER LIKE A LEMON

Bitter Like a Lemon is a new writing company giving a platform to working-class voices of Dublin, consisting of Actor/Producer/Director Amilia Stewart Keating, Producer/Stage Manager Evie McGuinness and Playwright Lee Coffey.

Their first production Leper + Chip, by Lee Coffey and directed Karl Shiels premiered in Theatre Upstairs in 2014 and toured Ireland and internationally. A Boy called Nedd by Emily Gilmor-Murphy, directed by Karl Shiels and Peruvian Voodoo, written and directed by Lee Coffey were produced alongside each other in Theatre Upstairs in 2015. In 2016



they produced Lee Coffey's third play Slice, the Thief, directed by Jeda De Bri. In 2017 they were the company in residence in Axis Ballymun, developing their next show From All Sides by Lee Coffey and directed by Aaron Monaghan which premiered in Dublin Fringe Festival 2017, co-produced with Axis Ballymun. During this residency they also produced a work in progress showing of Nothin' But A Toerag by Aisling O'Mara. Murder of Crows by Lee Coffey, directed by Karl Shiels premiered in Theatre Upstairs in 2016 and toured Ireland in 2018.

In 2018, Bitter Like a Lemon were commissioned by Dublin Port Company to develop a play about the history of Dublin's dock workers as a part of their Port Perspectives initiative. In 2019, In Our Veins by Lee Coffey and directed by Maisie Lee premiered as a part of The Abbey Theatre's 2019 season. They just finished developing their new show G.O.D (Good. Orderly. Direction.) by Lee Coffey and directed by Eoghan Carrick which will premiere in 2022.

Ali Hardiman

Ali is a graduate of The Gaiety School of Acting (2016) and Bow Street Academy (2017). As a writer, Ali performed in her debut self-penned comedy play *ELECTRIC* which toured the UK & Ireland in 2019 culminating in a 3 week run at Underbelly as part of the Edinburgh Fringe. It is now being developed for a feature film adaptation with Screen Ireland & Treasure Entertainment. Ali was one of 6 writers selected for the 24HR PLAYS at The Abbey Theatre and received the Patron Donation Award from Pavilion Theatre Dun Laoghaire to develop her play



THE DEATH OF PABLO which was scheduled for a work in progress reading as part of the Dublin Theatre Festival 2020. Ali is also an associate artist of the Civic Theatre. As an actress, Ali's recent credits include WRECKED (BBC3), CHRISTMAS AT CASTLE HART (Hallmark), and THE SOUTH WESTERLIES (RTÉ). Ali is represented by The Agency and Marianne Gunn O'Connor.

Lauren Shannon Jones is a writer and theatre maker. She wrote and performed *Viva Voce* in Dublin Fringe Festival 2018, which was nominated for a Fishamble New Writing award. In 2019 she was selected as one of six playwrights to be a part of the Abbey Works initiative, and was a resident Hot Desker at FRINGE LAB 2019/2020. She holds an MFA in playwriting from The Lir Academy.
